1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The University has an effective structured feedback system from different stakeholder's viz. students, faculty, alumni, parents and recruiters through formal, informal and interactive mechanisms in the design, review and updation of syllabus. The feedback received is analysed and action is taken to improve the teaching learning processes and experience of the stakeholders. Students' feedback is used as a base to make improvements that may lead the students learning to the next level and ensure their holistic development. Relevant inputs on professional enhancement activities and courses are provided in the form of Guest Lectures/Workshops, Site Visits, practical, Project evaluations by external industry experts, to get better placements. The University has adopted CBCS system to provide flexibility in the curriculum and develop skills in multidisciplinary fields. The curriculum is well mapped with the syllabus of competitive exams such as GATE, NET, etc. which helps students to perform better in national and international level exams. Preparatory classes help the students to comprehend the prerequisites of the exam. Frequent revision cycle, mock tests and experts talk make the students more confident and enthusiastic. In addition to this, more industry-specific inputs have been added in the curriculum to further bridge the gap between industry and academia. The employers have shown their satisfaction for the availability of choices of course in the schemes. The prescribed syllabi have been made more relevant by instilling soft skills, leadership skills, life skills, grooming and group discussion skills among the students through CTLD, a dedicated Centre for Training, Learning and Development in the University. CTLD's value added courses are comprehensive training solutions embedded into the curriculum of various programmes that primarily focus on overall development of every student. This caters to the students' need of developing soft skills and quantitative aptitude to combat the challenges of industry and getting professional training while studying. Parents' feedback forms an important criterion to improve our living-learning environment through Parents -teacher meetings held on a regular basis. The suggestions of parents are incorporated in the curriculum and adequate monitoring systems are installed to have an interaction with them to avoid any communication gap. The faculty members of the university also contribute to improve the curriculum and related learning tools and techniques. The feedback received is analysed and focused on qualitative improvement in content, pedagogy, learning material, student performance, research, and extension activities for Theory/Practical courses and other aspects related to curriculum. Based on the feedback obtained during the teaching-learning process, a course teacher is empowered to revise the contents of the course after obtaining formal approval from the Academic Review Committee which is put before Board of Studies and academic council for final approval. Alumni have a continued association with the university in terms of providing constructive feedback and are instrumental in enriching the syllabi for holistic development of the students. Recruiters' feedback serves an important role in the process of curriculum design and development. Their inputs have made curriculum effective in developing ICT communication skills and provide exposure to real life situations.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Teerthanker Mahaveer University has a vibrant 'Mentorship Program', under which the faculty members (mentor) and students(mentee) maintain a reciprocal relationship. This system aims at fostering the professional and personal development of both the faculty and student member. This mentor- mentee relationship helps to address the problems and difficulties relating to studies, infrastructural facilities, academic processes and procedures, academic and general atmosphere, psychological discomforts, peer conflicts etc faced by the students and provides moral, psychological, and professional learning support in all aspects. Faculty members are allotted 10-15 students each. A structured mentor mentee booklet is maintained by each mentor for record keeping, information and timely corrective action, if needed. This is counterchecked by respective HOD's/ principals on a regular basis in each semester till the students pass out. Personal mentors' have been assigned to help those weak students who are struggling with low performance in examinations, facing psychological or social imperfection. Mentors endeavour to strive towards the overall wellbeing of student and most of the student's participants have positively expressed their contentment with the resolution of any query related to

academic or personal matters. Mentors connect with the allocated mentees' and hold interactive discussions on various issues on regular basis and suggest possible way outs to the students to deal with their present situation. At the same time, parents are also kept in line with the situation to motivate and support their ward in all possible ways. The mentor challenges and motivates the students to higher level of active learning with innovative andragogy. Prompt and immediate feedback is given for corrective action, if any. There is a structured sequence of learning and assessing different activities in an unbiased manner. The mentorship programme aims to identify strengths and gaps, give them responsive coaching and modeling, appropriate feedback and remedial measures and eventually build healthy professional relationships. The Mentorship Programme is also a part of academic audit conducted twice a year to ensure its regularity and efficacy. The University conducts intensive 'Train the Trainer' workshops for the mentors to upgrade their mentoring skills and enrich their essential soft skills to deal with the mentees like attending, listening, observing, exploring and responding to the problems of the students, and how to avoid challenging and confronting situations. The mentor provides the opportunity to the mentee for discovering the information and career opportunities and involves in imparting outcome-based learning rather than lecturing. The mentor ensures to provide consultations to the students for present and future prospects beyond official working hours too and guides them to achieve their desired outcomes in a persistent and consistent manner. This practice has resulted in cultivating a strong alumni network, thus, providing the competitive edge to the growth and success of the University.

There are various committees like Library, Sports, Website Development etc. to ensure proper maintenance and upkeep. Suitable budget is allocated every year for the maintenance of various facilities. The various committees meet regularly to monitor the optimum use of infrastructure which is accessible to the students and staff of the University.

Laboratory: University provides domain specific lab facilities equipped with different types of instruments. For academic facilities there are lab incharges and staff coordinators. Equipment, instruments and appliances involved in the teaching learning process are provided continuous maintenance and repair. The advanced and expensive equipment are maintained through Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC). Small instruments/equipment like balance, microscope, pH meter, dissolution apparatus, mixer, hot plate are repaired time-to-time and maintained periodically.

Class Rooms: Most of the lectures take place in classrooms with projector, microphone and speakers. This is to ensure usage of new audiovisual pedagogical techniques during the teaching process along with this we have open classrooms where lecture are given. Administration Department has given the responsibilities to Administrative officers to keep the classroom clean. Checking of fans, teaching aids etc in the classroom are done regularly.

Library: The Library Advisory Committee with the Principal as the chairperson and librarian as member secretary along with three senior faculties tackle all issues relating to the smooth and efficient functioning of the library. At the time of admission students are issued library cards which will be valid till their final semester. Internet facility is provided in the library and students can access the facility for availing e-resources and other web based information. The University have subscribed to the EBSCO database, Clinical Key (Elsevier) and DELNET Database providing access to full text research articles and sector specific reports in different disciplines.

Sports complex (indoor and outdoor): The University has a Cricket stadium and pavilion par excellence. Twenty turf wickets of the University comply with the international standards and have hosted prestigious tournaments like Ranji Trophy and Cooch Behar Tournament. The University houses an indoor sports complex wherein the students can hone up their sports skills. Excellent indoor facilities are available in the indoor sports complex for table-tennis, basketball, volleyball, badminton, gymnastics, yoga, squash, tennis, and skating. The sports committee of the University is incharge of the sports complex and equipments. The committee supervises the Grounds-men and Grade IV staff assigned for maintenance and repair works.

Liquid Waste Management The University has established STP (Sea wage Treatment Plant) ETP (Effluent Treatment Plant) for the disposal of liquid base. After the treatment the treated waste water is used for the irrigation of agriculture field, grounds, parks etc of the university campus. 3. Biomedical Waste Management The University has signed MoU with SP Green Light Environment Waste Management LLP, 1st Floor, Tiwari Market, Opp Ram Janki Mandir, Bareilly - 243001 for the collection disposal of biomedical waste. (Link) 4. E-Waste Management The university has contract with Govt. authorized vendor - M/s Malik Associates, Khasra No-3148, Mo- Pathak, Chichrai Road, Jahangirabad, Tehsil- Anoopshahar, Distt.- Bulandshahar for the disposal E-Waste (plastic waste, electric waste electronic waste), who collects e-waste on periodical basis. 5. Waste Recycling System Degradable solid waste like tree leaf, grass etc. collected from the campus are dumped in the compost unit to produce organic fertilizer, which is used for gardening, nursery preparation floriculture purpose in the campus. 6. Hazardous Chemicals Radioactive Waste Management The hazardous chemicals of central laboratory has been dis-infected through autoclave the University has its own ETP (Effluent Treatment Plant) for the disposal of hazardous chemicals. The radioactive waste is not generated by the University. 7. Rainwater harvesting The University has it's own water lake with the capacity of 1 crore liter water. This large lake serve the main purpose of rain water harvesting. The rain water from the roofs tops of the buildings through drains, landscaped campus RCC roads recharge the ground water table throughout the year. 8. Construction of Tanks Bunds The University has constructed three water tanks and all tanks fulfill the following purposes- i. Household water requirements for the campus residents including hostels. ii. Fire safety water requirements. iii. For the irrigation of agriculture field, grounds, parks etc. 9.
